CD1.1, 1.2, 1.3. Ten Minutes to Relax = The Relaxation Company, 1999. Three CD set titled "Spirit," "Body," and "Mind." Each CD contains two 10 minute relaxation exercises. The speaker guides you through the exercises while new age music plays in the background. These CD's could be useful for those with anxiety, depression or who have trouble falling asleep.

CD2. Pathways Plus = Connect Wyoming, 10/2006. A comprehensive database of human service providers operating in Wyoming.

CD3. Brain Injury Resource Center = Brain Injury Association of Americas, 2002 Edition. Information is presented through text, video and audio, offering a wide range of information on all aspects of brain injury.

CD4. Boggle = Infogames. Race against the clock to create high-scoring words from a jumble of letter cubes. Play the classic Boggle game as well as four challenging mini-games. Features include five unique and addictively fun three-minute word games and online dictionary for reference and rulings on word spellings. Fun exercise for your spelling ability.

CD5. PSAT/SAT Ages 14-18 = TOPICS Entertainment, 2002. Get ready to ace your College Entrance Exams! Designed especially for ages 14 to 18, this disc makes for academically sound analysis of the SAT, covering everything from Math to Reading to Analogies. Good practice of academic skills.

CD6. Strategy Challenges Collection 2 In the Wild = Edmark, 1996. Games include Tablut, Jungle Chess and Surakarta. These games can help with planning and reasoning skills while still being fun and entertaining.

CD7. Snap! Everyday Fun and Learning: Multiplication Ages 7-10 = TOPICS Entertainment, 2002. Designed especially for kids ages seven to ten, this disc is chock full of lessons and games, while stressing operational and quantitative basics. With its solid blend of activities and education, this program is two times the fun!

CD8. Mavis Beacon Teaches Typing = TLC Education Properties, LLC, 2001. Whether you're learning to type or you want to improve, this typing program is a time-tested learning system that stands above the rest.

CD9. Encarta Encyclopedia Standard 2003 = Microsoft, 2002. An invaluable information resource with thousands of articles and hundreds of videos, animations and audio clips. Easy, fast access to a world of information.

CD10. The New Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia = Grolier, 1993.

CD11. Mahjongg Master 4 = eGames, Inc. 2002. CD13. CDC State Injury Profiles 2001 = Data by state, county and type in charts, graphs and maps. Easy access for research purposes.

CD14. Scrabble = Infogames. So you think you're smart? Well, choose your tiles, shuffle your rack, and get ready for the most brilliant, brain-teasing word game ever! Games features include five different skill levels, one to four players, and Merriam-Webster's Dictionary, 3rd Edition. Use this CD to stretch your reasoning and word recognition skills.

CD15. ADA Technical Assistance CD-ROM, Volume 3 = U.S. Department of Justice, Civil Rights Division, September 2004. This CD contains ADA Regulations, ADA Information, ADA Standards for Accessible Design, Technical Assistance Manuals, and Technical Assistance Publications.

CD16a, b. Brain Injury 101 – Project B.R.A.I.N. = Tennessee Disability Coalition. “Interactive CD with virtual classrooms to teach the reader about brain injury, causes, classroom accommodations, family resource center, web links, video clips, statistics, dictionary and much more.” For educators, families, and health care professionals who support students with traumatic brain injury.

CD17. The Virtual Lab Series = Howard Hughes Medical Institute, 2004. This fun and interactive virtual lab allows you to simulate lab experiences working with bacteria, cardiology, immunology, neurophysiology and transgenic flies. The neurophysiology lab lets you explore nerve cell responses.

CD18. Senses and Sensitivity: Neuronal Alliances for Sight and Sound = Howard Hughes Medical Insitute, 1997. Provides an interactive activity designed to increase your knowledge of how nerve cells work.

This program is designed for seniors, but is an eye-opener for drivers of all ages.

Contents include information on brain injury, living with the stages of brain injury, specialty topics, resources, questions & answers, glossary, and reading list & references. Also available in hardcopy – BIAW library book #36.5

CD23. Maryland’s Traumatic Brain Injury Post Demonstration Products = Maryland Mental Hygiene Administration, 2004?. Seven power point presentations: Criminal Justice System and TBI, Disability Support Staff Presentation, Mental Health and TBI, General TBI Presentation, Domestic Violence and TBI, TBI Screening and Resources, Neuropsychological Aspects of Brain Behavior. Handbook is included on the CD or is available in hardcopy – BIAW library book #34.4.

CD24. Brain Injury Resource Center: Defense & Veterans Brain Injury Center = Brain Injury Association of America, 1999. This interactive CD includes commonly asked questions, how brain injury affects people, treatment and rehabilitation, resources and support, real life experiences, the injured brain, preventing brain injury, and kid’s corner.

CD25. Management of Spasticity in Children with Cerebral Palsy: An Integrated Approach = Professional Postgraduate Services, September 2001. “Developed by a cross-disciplinary panel of healthcare professionals, this program addresses the physiology, clinical manifestations, evaluation, and treatment of pediatric patients with cerebral palsy who have spasticity and muscle overactivity.”

CD26. Freebies for Teachers: Life Science Powerpoints - Understanding Cancer and Related Topics = The National Cancer Institute and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, no date. Powerpoints include cancer, immune system, cancer genomics, molecular diagnostics, genetic variation (SNPs), cancer genome project, nanotechnology, angiogenesis, and estrogen receptors. Slides can be mixed and matched from different tutorials so lectures can be customized.

CD27. Ten Tips for Kids: Disability Etiquette = Produced by KAT Productions, 2004. The video portion of this CD features three elementary-aged girls presenting the Ten Tips. The resource portion includes lesson plans and sample exercises, Ten Tips sketches and text, People First text and examples, and Helpful Links. Can be used on PC or Mac.

CD28. Step-by-Step Guide to Assistive Technology: Switch Edition = Tash, Inc., 2005. "This education CD has been developed to demonstrate how a switch can be used for assistive technology. It is designed to help clinicians, physicians, teachers, students, parents, and users make a decision on the most appropriate switch for their client, student, child, or themselves." Includes video and interactive activities.

CD29. Brain Injury Partners: Advocacy Skills for Parents = Oregon Center for Applied Science, 2004. This CD teaches parents how to advocate effectively in a non-combative manner. Requires installation and an open internet connection.

CD30. Quality Living, Inc. = Quality Living, Inc., 2004. This is an interactive CD with detailed information on this rehabilitation program in Omaha, Nebraska.

CD31. Neurotherapy for Learning Disabled, Attention Deficit Disorder, Attention Deficit-Hyperactive Disorder, and Traumatic Brain Injury = Dr. Kirtley E. Thornton, New Jersey, 2005. This audio and visual presentation describes the types and numbers of children in the school system who could benefit from Activation qEEG Neurotherapy. The second half of the presentation describes Activation qEEG Neurotherapy and how it improves cognitive functioning and emotional problems with no side effects and for less expense than educational or medical interventions. 50 minutes

CD32. Parenting Wisely: 5 in 1 Demo = Family Works, Inc., 2004. This CD-ROM contains demonstrations of five programs in the Parenting Wisely series. These interactive tutorials in American, British, and Spanish provide effective parenting skills for the treatment and prevention of child behavior problems for young children, teenagers, and foster/residential care. A SAMHSA Model Program.

CD33. Brain Injury Association of New York State: Information, Support, Resources = Brain Injury Association of New York State, no date. "These materials and information address the major stages and transitions that are part of living with brain injury."

Also includes a "Brain Injury 101" section that will be useful for others.

CD37. Bicycle Helmet Program Toolkit = Bicycle Helmet Safety Institute, February 2006. Topics include Bicycle Helmet Campaign Guide, Bicycle Rodeo Guide, Lesson Plans for Teachers, The WABA Bike Safety Site, and The entire BHSI Web site.

CD38. The State of Ohio's Needs and Resource Assessment of Individuals with Brain Injury and Their Families = Ohio Legal Rights Service (OLRS), 2006. CD40 Technical Medical Animation Corporation, Closed Head Injury = TMAC Productions, 1991. Biomechanics of a closed head injury including shearing and axonal injury are illustrated in this easy-to-understand production. Also available in VHS (BIAW Library #72). 10 min.

CD41 Enhancing Bicycling Safety: Law Enforcement's Role by NHTSA. An interactive training for law enforcement officers. This is a self-paced interactive training designed for all law enforcement officers with the understanding that most do not receive any training on bicycle safety. Discusses rules-of-the-road and heightened awareness and application of these rules by law enforcement.

CD42 Existing Facility Checklist – See book by the same name which includes this CD.

CD43 CDCYNERGY Violence Prevention Edition. Self-paced tool designed to help violence prevention program planners conceptualize, plan, and develop health communication programs. Programs aimed at preventing child abuse, intimate partner violence, sexual violence and youth violence would benefit from this six phase approach to planning.

CD44 CPS Short Course: Car Seat Training Series - 3 car seat courses using PowerPoint presentations, pdf files for handouts and video clips. 101 is for expectant parents and parents of newborns, 202 is for parents of toddlers age 1 through 14, 303 talks about the law, physics and the wide variety of child safety seats, their proper uses and how to attach

them. Includes a short PowerPoint to train trainers in how to teach these courses. Requires PowerPoint, Adobe and video software capable of playing .mpg or .avi files

CD45 Living with Brain Injury – MPEG-4 format and may not run on your computer.

CD46 Wyoming Statewide Independent Living Council (SILC) Information CD: Contains a variety of documents associated with SILC including form to apply for an appointment to the Council, bylaws, satisfaction survey, invitation to apply, procedures, SILC brochure, member list as of 2007 and the state plan.

CD47 Veteran PSA's – CD containing PSA's created for public radio airing. These speak to military returning from the conflicts in Afghanistan and Iraq and are intended to point out the risk of brain injury in those conflict theaters.

CD48a/b Adventure Trail – Interactive Off-Highway Vehicle Fun – Created by the National Off-Highway Vehicle Conservation Council. Outlines safety gear for ATV riding. Has various games and activities that highlight different aspects of safety. Primarily aimed at younger children ages 8 – 15.

DVD1. Bike Helmet PSA – Protect the Stuff You Care About = Brain Injury Association of America, 2004. PSA that promotes the use of bike helmets. 35 seconds.

DVD2. Stranger In The Family = Hearst Entertainment, 2003. Based on a true story, sixteen year old, Steve Thompson seemed to have everything going for him, until a car accident changed everything. Steve is diagnosed with a concussion, but his condition is actually worse. His family comes to realize that the person they knew is gone and now there is a stranger in the family. 96 minutes

DVD3. UW TBI Model System 2004 Videoconference Series (set of three DVDs), 2004. The seminars included are: "Brain Injury Basics: How Brain Functions are Affected," "Psychiatric Disorders and TBI," "Understanding and Managing Behavioral Problems in TBI," "The Pragmatics of Communication and TBI," "Self-Advocacy: Navigating the Health Care System," and "Tips for Effective Case Management & Caregiver Support." The handouts for each session are available online at www.BIAUSA.org/wyoming. This series is also available in video format.

DVD4a, b. Technical Medical Animation Corporation, Closed Head Injury = TMAC Productions, 1991. Biomechanics of a closed head injury including shearing and axonal injury are illustrated in this easy-to-understand production. Also available in VHS (BIAW Library #72). 10 min.

DVD5. Getting the Brain to Change: Dr. Powell's Top Ten Exercises for Brain Injury Survivors = Dr. Mike Powell, Cedar Rapids, IA, 2005. Through his years as a

chiropractor, Dr. Powell has compiled ten activities that have been helpful for most people.

DVD6a, b. The Spirituality in Brain Injury Recovery = Patrick A. Jones, 2005. This lecture was presented at the Brain Injury Conference in Sheridan, Wyoming. Patrick takes you through his life as a brain injury survivor, tells you about his adaptations, and helps you explore the relationships in your life. Includes handouts. 77 minutes

DVD7. Every 21 Seconds...or Why I Scream at the Refrigerator = New Mexico Brain Injury Advisory Council, 2005. Every 21 seconds another person joins the world of brain injury. This world is random, unforgiving. The sidewalk moves, colors dance, and a grocery store can be hell. But there is also rebirth, simplicity, and quiet. Eight stories in seven parts, narrated by Woody Harrelson. 60 minutes

DVD8a, b. Pieces of the Puzzle: An Introduction to Brain Injury = The University of Iowa, 1999. Brain injury can cause dramatic changes. The functions of the brain, causes of brain injury, what kind of changes can occur, and a list of resources are included. Useful for staff, families, and survivors. 25 minutes

DVD9. A Special Trust = Wells Fargo, 2006. "Special needs trusts are typically structured to allow distributions to beneficiaries for items not covered by public benefits ("special needs") so that the beneficiaries do not lose their covered benefits." 16 minutes

DVD10. Family Works = Family Works, Inc., 2005. "This is an example of Parenting Wisely in practice and includes: BBC Feature on Parenting Wisely and Using Parenting Wisely with Substance Abusing Moms.

DVD11. A Healing Journey: Traumatic Brain Injury in Native America = Ohio Traumatic Brain Injury Collaborative, 2006. "As health care professionals working in fast paced delivery systems, we find it difficult to take the time to listen. If you are interested in understanding key cultural nuances of the Native American TBI client and in gaining insight into the unique circumstances of Traumatic Brain Injury in Native America, we urge you to actively listen to this story in its entirety with the attention to culture, heritage, and the prevailing challenges in Indian country today. Indeed, this story provides a fascinating experiential and compelling account of an American Indian and his experience with western health care."

DVD12. Life Goes On: Person Centered Planning for Life After Traumatic Brain Injury = Department of Educational Technology College of Education University of Hawaii, 2006. "The HMSA Foundation provided funding to develop a training curricula to empower service providers and persons with traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) over the age of 21 (and family members, if appropriate) to collaboratively develop a contract for services grounded in a person centered philosophy. This DVD is part of the curriculum."

DVD13a,b,c. Understanding Epilepsy = Wyoming Epilepsy Association, 2006. This DVD includes three videos. "Because You Are My Friend" is a five minute cartoon for

children. “Building on Knowledge” (19 min.) shows five kinds of seizures in children. “What Can I Do?” (31 minutes) explores myths about seizures.

DVD14 BI: A Practical Training for Mental Health Professionals This DVD was put together by the Rhode Island Brain Injury Association. It is nearly 50 minutes in length, and is a very good primer on the causes and consequences of traumatic brain injury. It also offers some advice on coping, and talks about designing a memory system for brain injury survivors. The nine chapters are helpful to both the injured and the caregiver.

DVD15 BI: A Practical Training for Vocational Rehabilitation Counselors This DVD was put together by the Rhode Island Brain Injury Association. It spends time discussing how to return brain injury survivors to the workforce. It focuses on not just the difficulties, but the solutions to those problems. It also features survivors who tell how they accomplished getting back into suitable employment.

DVD16 BI: A Practical Training for Case Managers. This DVD was put together by the Rhode Island Brain Injury Association. It runs almost 45 minutes and begins with a basic primer on brain injury. From there it is a good source of information on various techniques for case managers. It details how to communicate, how to help survivors with memory loss and what kinds of assistive technology can benefit a survivor. Also, the video includes the thoughts of survivors on what case managers need to do to help them.

DVD17 BI: A Practical Training for Substance Abuse Treatment Professionals. This DVD was put together by the Rhode Island Brain Injury Association. It is nearly 50 minutes in length, and is a very good primer on the causes and consequences of traumatic brain injury. This DVD offers some information on substance abuse, which is often a problem that brain injury survivors either had before the injury, or acquire after the injury. The video offers ideas on what to look for and then how to treat various substance abuse problems, which often make recovery even more difficult.

DVD18 Police Training Series: A series designed to train police officers in interacting with individuals with brain injury. This DVD was put together with help from Maryland Brain Injury Association. It is nearly 30 minutes in length, and is a very good example of what law enforcement often encounters when dealing with brain injury survivors. Several real life situations are depicted by actors and actual law enforcement officials. The video highlights how the various situations should be handled.

DVD19 Understanding TBI: Welcoming the TBI Survivor Back into Your Community Group

DVD20 Bob Woodruff: Turning Personal Injury into Public Inquiry (Oprah, Bob Woodruff Reports, Nightline)

DVD21 Educational Strategies for Students with Acquired Brain Injury: A Training Manual for School Personnel. A comprehensive training designed for school personnel

and others interested in understanding and supporting students with acquired brain injury (ABI). This CD contains a PDF file of the training manual and is best viewed using Acrobat Reader. Print quality is best on a black & white printer. Also included are accompanying PowerPoint slides and supplemental PowerPoint slides on developmental stages.

DVD22 Brain Injury: A Practical Training for Direct Caregivers = DHS & BIARI

DVD23 (2 discs) TBI: Acquired BI in Children and Adolescents: Weaving a Safety Net Through Education and Training – BrainSTARS (BIAW Library book 258) (and Supplemental CD) This training is an accompaniment to the BrainSTARS manual. Module 1: Introduction to Brain Injury. Module 2: Effects of ABI - Infant to Preschool, Elementary to Adolescents. Module 3: ABC's of Successful Behavior and Learning. Module 4: Intervention Strategies for Accommodations & Modifications. Each module is approximately 30 minutes, for a total time of 138 minutes. The Supplemental CD includes PDF files of a pre- and post-test, evaluation, powerpoint, TBI Community Resources, and HCP Regional Offices (Colorado).

DVD24 Rearview: Looking Back: Teens talk to teens about their fatal automobile crashes and the impact it had on their lives. Teens talk about wearing seatbelts, the loss of their friends and the changes to their lives resulting from automobile crashes they were involved in.

DVD25a/b Crash Course: Follows a brain injury survivor and his family as they turn their lives upside down to adjust to their son's injury. Also examines denial by family and friends as well as prejudice by outsiders. 91 minutes

DVD26 Understanding Traumatic Brain Injury – DVBIC: This 29-minute video, introduced by General Colin L. Powell, USA (Ret.), offers an introduction to TBI, and features the recovery journeys of several service personnel and their families. Chapters include TBI Overview, Recovery, Concussion & Sports and Community Re-entry. Useful in both the military and civilian sectors.

DVD27 Living With a Traumatic Brain Injury - University of Washington, April 2007. The uplifting stories of four brain injury survivors are interspersed with professional commentary about basic brain injury treatment and recovery. The six chapters include physical, cognitive, and personality changes that effect the survivor and their family. Easy to understand overview of brain injury for a general audience. 28 minutes

DVD28 Coping with Brain Injury Volume I: A collection of speakers talking about 1) Medical & Scientific Advances, 2) Legal Evidence & Tactics, 3) Rehabilitation Trends, and 4) Mental Health Strategies.

DVD29 Coping with Brain Injury Volume I: A collection of speakers talking about 1) Brain Injury & School Success, 2) Caregiving Strategies, 3) Robots & Rehabilitation, and 4) Life After Brain Injury.

DVD30 Seizures and You – Short video with mostly teenage actors. Speaks to teasing and heckling suffered by those with Epilepsy and impacted by seizures. Talks about and has video examples of various types of seizures and their impacts.

DVD31 How to fit a Helmet (English and Spanish): A very well done helmet fitting video. Suitable for training a parent to fit a child's helmet or for training helmet fitters for a program. Seven well-edited minutes covering all the essentials of helmet fit. An adult demonstrates fitting a number of children. Trainers should probably see it twice.

DVD32 Child Safety Seats Discusses child safety seats, the reason for using them and how to properly use them to protect your children. Seven languages including English, Spanish Hmong, Somali, Vietnamese, Lao, and Khmer.

DVD33 Wyoming Signitures - Equestrian Helmet Interview: Second story interviews a sports medicine physician who is passionate about seeing helmets on equestrian (horse) participants.

DVD34 Texas NeuroRehab Center – promotional materials from Texas NeuroRehab Center, specializing in programs for brain injury, neurobehavioral, psychiatric and Medical issues.

DVD35 The Oaks Treatment Center – promotional DVD from The Oaks Treatment Center specializing in Psychiatric treatment of children and adolescents.

DVD36 Discover the Possibilities at The Colorado Center for the Blind – promotional DVD from The Colorado Center for the Blind.

DVD37 ATV – Youth Safety – Arctic Cat production discussing proper techniques for riding ATV's, includes discussions of proper clothing, safety gear and ATV operation.

DVD38 Wyoming Seat Belt Coalition - Compilation DVD – 3 advertisements for wearing seatbelts including “Trunk Trooper” ads. Stories by and/or about young people hurt or killed in crashes because of not wearing seatbelts.

DVD39 The Other Breakfast Club: A Documentary on Traumatic Brain Injury After a Car Crash - The National Road Safety Foundation, Inc., 2008. Six twenty-something-year-old car crash survivors who went through rehabilitation at the same time meet for the Breakfast Club. Reenactments and interviews with their mothers, medical personnel, and therapists give viewers a glimpse into the world of brain injury and recovery. Good for teens and young adults. 45 minutes

Audiotape 1. What Doctors Don't Know About Nutritional Medicine = Ray Strand, M.D., 2001. Dr. Strand explains why nutritional medicine is the most important aspect in protecting your health.

Audiotape 2. Gray Matters: The Arts and the Brain = The Dana Alliance for Brain Initiatives, 2002. The brain mold requires three large boxes of flavored/colored gelatin, 1 can of non-fat milk, a few drops of food coloring, and some vegetable oil (supplies not included). Demonstrates the damage caused by brain injury such as falls, shaken baby syndrome, or motor vehicle accidents. People of all ages get an eye-opener with this activity! Great science fair project!
